Executive Summary

Nicola Clase currently serves as Sweden's ambassador to Finland. She was previously Coordinator for Migration and Refugee Issues at the Swedish Ministry for Foreign Affairs, and prior to that she was the Swedish Ambassador to the UK for six years.

Nicola Clase held the position as State Secretary for foreign and EU affairs in the Prime Minister's Office from 2006–2008. As State Secretary for Foreign and EU affairs she served as the Prime Minister's Sherpa on EU affairs and was appointed the Swedish Government's chief negotiator on the EU Lisbon Treaty.

From 1991 through 1999 and from 2002 through October 2004 Ambassador Clase served in the Swedish Foreign Ministry and had postings in London and Copenhagen.

Born June 8, 1965 in Gothenburg, Sweden she earned her Master Degree in East Asian Studies from the University of Stockholm. She has also studied at Beijing Teacher's College (Beijing Shifan Daxue) in China. She served as a fellow at the Weatherhead Center for International Affairs (WCFIA) at Harvard University 1999-2000 and as an associate at Harvard University 2008–2009.
